

## **Understanding the Campus Expression Climate**

Supporting Documentation: Codebook

Fall 2020

## Introduction

This codebook helps researchers analyze data from Heterodox Academy's Fall 2020 administration of the Campus Expression Survey (CES). Please see heterodoxacademy.org for Campus Expression Climate: Fall 2020. This document includes four tables, each of which provides variable names, as they appear in the available CES Fall 2020 data (.csv file), along with their corresponding survey items and response options.

Table 1 includes items from the CES Core Module, which asks students how comfortable or reluctant they are expressing their views on a noncontroversial topic and five potentially controversial topics (i.e., gender, politics, race, religion, and sexuality orientation) during a classroom discussion. These questions were slightly reworded for 2020 to be applicable to both in-person and online classroom discussions. Students who responded that they were "somewhat reluctant" or "very reluctant" to express their views on any of these controversial topics then answered an additional question, indicating the consequences about which they were concerned if they expressed their views on any controversial topic. This way of asking about the consequences of discussing controversial topics is different than in the Fall 2019 administration, which asked about such consequences for each core topic that a respondent expressed reluctance to discuss.

Table 2 includes two items that ask students how comfortable or reluctant they are expressing their views on two specific controversial issues relevant in 2020, which were Black Lives Matter and the Fall 2020 Presidential Election.

Table 3 includes items from the Viewpoint Diversity Module, which asks students about their perception of viewpoint diversity on their campuses. It also included some questions about how the Fall 2020 semester may have been different than previous years (for non-freshmen only).



Table 4 includes demographic items that were at the end of the Fall 2020 Campus Expression Survey and some questions specific to the Fall 2020 semester (e.g., whether their classes were primarily online or in-person).

Heterodox Academy invites researchers, journalists, and others to explore and interact with these data, which can inform national conversations about the state of open inquiry and constructive disagreement in higher education.
